

Wright Co. is a part of Economic Development Region 7W, which is located in the Central Planning Region.

POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS



Wright Co. is the 10th largest of the 87 counties in the state. Its population increased so far this decade, ranking as the 1st fastest growing in the state from 2020 to 2023. Wright Co.'s population has a younger median age than the state and a smaller percentage of people aged 65 years and older. The population is aging, especially as the Baby Boom generation moves through the population pyramid (see Figure 1).

Wright Co. enjoyed a natural increase - more births than deaths from 2020 to 2023, but also experienced net in-migration - meaning more people moved in than moved out. In addition to domestic in-migration, Wright Co. welcomed net international in-migration - gaining new Minnesotans from foreign countries (see Table 2).


Figure 2. Place of Birth for the Foreign Born Population,

65-74 years



Wright Co.'s population was becoming more racially diverse over time. Since 2011, the county's white population increased and the number of people of other races increased (see Table 4).





POPULATION PROJECTIONS

According to the Minnesota State Demographic Center, Wright Co.'s population is expected to grow from 2025 to 2035, with a rate of change that is slower than the projected statewide growth rate (4.5%). In addition to the overall growth, the number of people aged 65 years and older is expected to increase over the next decade (see Figure 4 and Table 5).

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT





LABOR FORCE TRENDS

At 2.9%, Wright Co. had a higher unemployment rate than the state in 2023. After the pandemic recession Wright Co.'s unemployment rate declined compared to the 3.3% pre-pandemic rate posted in 2019. The number of unemployed workers actively seeking work in Wright Co. increased over the past year, and is down compared to 2019.

Labor force growth has slowed in recent years. After experiencing a net gain of workers each year from 1990 to 2000, Wright Co. averaged an annual gain of new workers from 2000 to 2010, and most recently a gain of new workers since 2010 (see Figure 7). Moving forward, Wright Co. is expected to add workers from 2025 to 2035 (see Table 6).




The labor market had grown extremely tight in recent years, with less than 1 jobseeker per vacancy until the pandemic recession intervened in early 2020 and the number of unemployed workers spiked. In 2023, job vacancies in Central returned to pre-pandemic levels, but employers are still seeing challenges finding enough workers for open jobs (see Figure 8).

LABOR FORCE CHARACTERISTICS

Wright Co. had a higher labor force participation rate than the state. The labor force in Wright Co. is less racially diverse than the state (where 81.3% of workers are white alone), but is becoming more diverse over time.







INCOMES, COST OF LIVING, & HOUSING

Wright Co. had a higher median household income than the state, and a lower percentage of households with incomes below \$50,000. Overall, Wright Co. had the 4th highest median household income of the 87 counties in the state.



The cost of living has increased over the past 2 years with costs up in many areas. Wright Co. had a higher cost of living than the state, with a required hourly wage of \$18.19 for a single person living alone to meet a basic needs cost of living, and an hourly wage requirement of \$22.61 for a typical family with 2 adults and 1 child (see Table 9).

Wright Co. had a higher median house value than the state, having the 6th highest value of the 87 counties in 2022. Wright Co.'s housing stock was newer than the state's, with a higher percentage of units built since 2000 (see Figure 12).





OCCUPATIONS

At \$23.85 in 2024, wages were lower in Region 7W than the state. Overall, Region 7W had the 3rd highest median hourly wage level of the 13 economic development regions in the state. Wages were highest for management occupations (\$49.28) and lowest for food preparation and serving related jobs (\$14.86) (see Table 11).




ECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS

Figure 16. Industry Employment Statistics, 2008-2023


